The 2021 Census is due to be held on the 21st March 2021 and for the first time it will be predominantly digital, however if you do not have access to the internet paper questionnaires will still be available. The Office of National Statistics use the census to gather general information from the population. Personal information and circumstances are not shared with anyone. More information will soon start to appear in the media.
